Activity Aim (As per detail in the Program Schedule): Sector Support and Development - To build the capacity of the sector to meet the needs of the clients; incorporate the outcomes of the evaluations; and develop best practice.

Objectives for the Activity (As per Part B of the Program Schedule):

- a) Build the capacity and competency of Commonwealth HACC service providers to deliver consumer/carer responsive services through the Commonwealth HACC Program.
- b) Demonstrate leadership and facilitate service system reform and improved, innovative practice to organisations funded under the Commonwealth HACC Program.
- c) Initiate and promote co-operative collaborations and partnerships that facilitate the ongoing development of organisations funded under the Commonwealth HACC Program to be more efficient, effective, integrated and outcomes-focussed.
- d) Undertake needs identification and planning at a regional level to address service gaps and to develop resources that contribute to increasing the effectiveness and sustainability of organisations funded under the Commonwealth HACC Program.

Executive Summary

This year the Southern Services Reform Group (SSRG) has maintained sector relationships, and focused on supporting aged care service providers through the transition into the Commonwealth Home Support Programme. The SSRG has been integral in providing training, facilitating shared problem solving, developing innovative approaches and sharing knowledge. There was a period when it was unclear whether the Collaborative Projects would continue in their current format, creating some uncertainty and impacting some-what on the projects' outcomes.

The SSRG email network reaches 218 people in the southern region who then share with their networks and receive regular information and updates relevant to the aged care sector. Face to face meetings occur regularly through the Steering Committee and workgroups; this involves 107 individuals who deliver programs for older people in the south. The outcomes achieved by the workgroups have been significant over the last 4 years, focusing on a range of sector issues. These projects support aged care providers and older people, promoting an environment of wellness and reablement.

To complement the post carers on-line resource which was completed last year, an animated film was created to tell the story of a post carer's experience and delivers a clear message that there is light at the end of the tunnel. The film is aptly titled 'Life after caring' and can be viewed on the SSRG you-tube channel. Images of kites are used in the animation and symbolically represent a new phase or experience - reviewing the past and moving towards a new life perspective.

The Memory Hub at the Noarlunga Library, developed in partnership with the SSRG Dementia Workgroup, City of Onkaparinga and Alzheimer's Australia SA has been open to the public for 10 months. Consumers can borrow activities suitable for people with dementia, books about brain health and dementia and access information about available services and supports. The number of loans total 320. It also won a Local Government Association Professional Leadership Excellence Award in the category of Aged Friendly Communities. The Memory Hub is being re-created in 2 regional libraries – Port Lincoln and Port Augusta.

The I Can(t) Workshops, developed by the SSRG and Eastern Collaborative Project have been delivered 8 times over the past 3 years using an action research model. Work is almost completed on a train the trainer package and further trials and evaluations are scheduled to provide further evidence of the impact the workshops could have in the sector – that is, to address the issue of motivation and confidence, ensuring older people are well equipped to set meaningful goals and make decisions related to living life well. A number of presentations have been made about the program, including at the Ageing in a Foreign Land Conference (Flinders University) and the Cultural Diversity Engaging in Healthy and Active Ageing Forum (Adelaide G-TRAC Centre and The University of Adelaide).

The hero project of 2014/15 was 'War against loneliness – what's stopping you?' It was developed under the broad theme of loneliness and included information from all previous projects developed by the SSRG in the last 4 years. All projects, had in some way, promoted reducing social isolation and loneliness. 2000 motivating, inspirational and informative calendars were produced and distributed in the south. It has generated an awareness of loneliness and provided solutions and opportunities – a reablement approach.

The Seniors Southern Services Directory App has been updated to ensure the information is in line with the changes to aged care and the reforms. Total App usage is 6,832 sessions with a total of 996 users.

A highlight of the year was the Symposium, 'Living Well in a Complex Life' which the SSRG played a significant role in organising and supporting. It was attended by many providers from the south and presented some new ways to embed wellness into practice.
